L'Hermine (Courted) 2016 French language - subtitles dir. Christian Vincent : starring Patrice Luchini, Sidse Babett Knudsen 98 mins. If you fell in love with the Danish Prime Minister in TV's Borgen (Sidse Babett Knudsen) and/or you were entranced by The Women on the 6th Floor (Fabrice Luchini) and/or you just like a good courtroom drama, this is a film for you. Curmudgeonly Judge Racine (Luchini) whose personal life is in shreds and who takes it out on those who appear before him in his Parisian criminal court suddenly realises that Dr Lorensen-Coteret (Knudsen) is a member of the jury for the homicide trial he is about to preside over. And he has been secretly in love with the lovely Dr Lorensen-Coteret since she treated him some years previously. Need we say more!? Well, yes. The acting is wonderful. Sidse Knudsen won the Cèsar (French Oscar) and Fabrice Luchini won the Volpi Cup (Venice) for Best Actors and the film also won Best Screenplay at Venice. Enjoy!

Salmon Fishing in Yemen (M) 2011

2011 dir. Lahse Hellstrom: starring Ewan McGregor, Emily Blunt, Kristin Scott Thomas, Amr Waked 107 mins. Paul Torday wrote and published the novel on which this film is based in 2007. He intended it as a savage but comical political satire. But the movies being what they are, here in the translation to the screen the satire gets transmuted into a romantic comedy cum modern fairy story. The role of Patricia Maxwell (Scott Thomas), the Prime Minister's outrageous and opportunistic spin doctor preserves the satirical intent of the book but now only as a supporting character. The film tells the charming story of how a fisheries expert in the British Public Service gets inveigled into helping a wealthy Yemeni sheikh set up a salmon fishery to introduce the sport of fly-fishing to his countrymen, and finds love. In view of the grim news we hear of the Yemen currently it is useful to recall that in 2011 before the Saudis started their ag-gression, it was a place predominantly of peace and hope.
